# **Some Moments During the Scouts Try Dive**







#### GOING DOWN ON OLD WRECKS

#### The Mikhail Lermontov.



Diving. There are so many reasons why we do it. Some of us, underwater twitchers with a tick list to complete, get all excited by spotting a John Dory. Others love to fill a catch bag for supper. For me, it's rusty metal that does the trick. The history, cargo and layout of a wreck, the story of how it met its end and the challenge of ferreting around it to see what I can learn are what keeps relentlessly emptying my wallet, giving me endless hours of pleasure and perplexing my long-suffering wife.

One of the very finest examples of this noble pastime has to be


the Mikhail Lermontov. The result of a truly astonishing series of cock-ups in February 1986, this Russian passenger

liner on a cruise from Australia, having called in at Wellington then Picton in New Zealand, tore a hole in her hull on submerged rocks whilst rounding Cape Jackson in the Marlborough Sounds and sank quite unnecessarily 6 hours later, with the loss of just one unfortunate crew member. The whole story really is, as they say, stranger than fiction. I'll talk about it at club one night if there's sufficient interest; I have some great pics and video footage.

This huge liner, 176m long and lying on a 37m seabed, is a true wreck diver's paradise. With a 25m beam and lying on its starboard side (see below) it offers plenty of time on the wreck. Breathing Nitrox, more than an hour on the wreck itself is comfortably possible on twins with no decompression at all. This becomes a safe and necessary luxury for the more 'technical' divers who want to penetrate the darker and more remote areas deep within the wreck on open circuit. It does not have to be, however, a difficult and technical wreck. There is something for everyone; there is even plenty of explorable superstructure from 15-20m, including some great penetration of 'daylight' zones, for Ocean or PADI Open Water divers (BSAC is a rarity in this part of the world).

For Sports divers and above, there's plenty to mess with your head – and it really is great fun. With the wreck on its side, everything is at 90 degrees to what your brain expects. The Bridge, for example (left image, above the deck), is a straight ascent; in through a window at about 32m then a zigzag ascent through a reasonably lit, narrow space, popping out of a window or doorway whenever you want,

anywhere up to 18m. There's lots of this sort of thing; the Bolshoi Lounge, an eerie, sideways-on lounge/ballroom with

tables, bolted to the floor, seeming like steel mushrooms growing sideways out of the wall, with the dance floor, one deck below, viewed over a balcony rail from the lounge, now a huge void dropping away sideways. Dare you swim down to it? Hmm ... of course you can, it's on the same level! A swimming pool near the stern, just a huge blue-tiled rectangular hole rearing up to your left hand side as you swim past it heading for'ard. The Winter Gardens, a wide enclosed promenade corridor with huge openings plunging down into the darkness below you. Why? Of course, they're just corridors heading off to the side towards the interior of the ship ...... see what I mean?

Then there's the dark stuff. Signs and disclaimers everywhere state that only suitably qualified and experienced divers should attempt penetration beyond the daylight zone, and the dive company justifiably boasts an exceptional safety record. There's the massive engine room, pitch black, with its complex layers of walkways, stairs, machinery and gigantic piston block all lying sideways; the restaurant, kitchens, scullery, crew's mess, duty free shop and several bars, all deep within the ship's interior. The corridors which give access to these areas, as you might imagine in a 1970s built Eastern Bloc passenger liner, are claustrophobic, the stairwells tight and convoluted (as well as now being sideways instead of up and down) and there are the ever-present silt and entanglement hazards as this is a 'real' wreck, not stripped out for divers. Doing all this in the pitch black, even with a powerful torch, plays havoc with your senses and you need to keep a cool head and precise buoyancy. Wreck reels must be used at all times to offer you a way out if you get lost or disorientated. The line itself can of course become a severe hazard if not laid properly.

I was extremely fortunate. Diving with <u>Godive.co.nz</u> and staying in the live-ashore <u>Lermontov Lodge</u> just 10 minutes' boat ride from the wreck site, one of the most experienced penetration divers in the country was on the expedition with me. I dived with Aaron most of the week and thanks to his experience, was able to do some of the deepest and most complicated penetration runs that the wreck has to offer. They allow the removal of 'a souvenir' to any diver who can penetrate this far; I hauled out a 'Morflot' stamped sugar bowl (Russian civilian fleet crest) from the crockery store in the restaurant which I hope to get back to the UK in one piece, bubble wrap permitting.

Most of us dive a wreck once or twice then move on to another. A full week on this one is nowhere near enough. It is, quite simply, the most exciting and challenging diving I've ever undertaken. I'll be back as soon as ever I can afford it. At present, a week diving the wreck including flights from the UK costs about £2,000. That's only half the cost of a trip to Truk Lagoon – a bargain. Anyone up for it?




